Do you have to file? Refer to the Form 1040 instructions to determine if you are required to file a tax return. Even if you don't have to file a tax return, you may be eligible for a refund if box 2 shows an amount or if you are eligible for an you redit. Earned income credit (EC). You may be able to take the EIC for 2023 if your adjusted gross income (AGI) is less than a certain amount. The amount of the credit is based on income and family size. Workers without children could qualify for a smaller credit. You and any qualifying children must have valid social security numbers (SSNs). You can't take the EIC if your investment income is more than the specified amount for 2023 or if income is more than the specified amount for 2023 information, visit www.irs.gov/EIC. Box 8. This amount is not included in box 1, 3, 5, or 7. For information on how to report tips on your tax return, see the Form 1040 instructions. You must file Form 4137 with your income tax return to report at least the allocated tip amount unless you can prove with adequate records that you received a smaller amount. If you have records that show the actual amount of tips you received, report that amount even if its more or less than the allocated tips. Use Form 4137 to figure the social security and Medicare tax owed on tips you didn't report to your employer. Enter this amount on the wages line of your tax return. By filing Form 4137, your social security tips will be credited to your social security record (used to figure your benefits).

Box 10. This amount includes the total dependent care benefits that your employer paid to you or incurred on your behalf (including amounts from a section 125 (cafeteria) plan). Any amount over your employer's plan limit is also included in box 1. See Form 2414. IBox 11. Elective deferrals (codes D, E, F, and S) and designated Roth contributions (codes AA, BB, and EE) under all plans are generally limited to a total of \$22,500 (\$15,500 if you only have SIMPLE plans; 252,500 for section 403(b) plans if you qualify for the 15-year rule explained in Pub. 571). Deferrals under code G are limited to \$22,500. Deferrals under code H are limited to \$7,000.

Nowever, if you were at least age 50 in 2023, your employer may have allowed an additional deferral of up to \$7,500 (\$3,500 for section 401(K)(11) and 408(p) SIME Epians). This additional deferral amount is not subject to the overall limit on elective deferrals. For code G, the limit on elective deferrals may be higher for the last 3 years before you reach retirement age. Contact your plan administrator for more information. Federal and State Refundable Tax Credits are Available for Working Colorado Individuals and Families



What is a refundable tax credit?

A refundable tax credit puts money back in the pockets of hardworking taxpayers like you. You may be able to claim a credit even if you don't normally file a tax return. If you qualify for a refundable credit, any amount of the credit remaining after reducing the amount of taxes that you may owe to zero is refunded to you.



Earned Income Tax Credits

You may be eligible for refundable tax credits if you earned less than \$63,400 in 2023.

Generally, eligibility for the Colorado earned income tax credit is based on your eligibility for the federal earned income tax credit. Colorado has expanded eligibility for the Colorado credit for filers who cannot claim the federal credit. You work

hard. See if the earned income tax credits can work just as hard for you! Visit <u>Tax.Colorado.gov/ctc-eitc</u> for more information.



Child Tax Credits

You may be eligible to claim these partially refundable credits if you have a social security number or individual taxpayer identification number, have at least one child, and are part of a low- or middle-income family.
